There was a unique wow magic that unfolded as we drove into the grounds of the university campus. It's a blend of excitement, curiosity, and anticipation—a feeling that anything is possible and that every corner holds a new adventure.

On Friday 26<sup>th</sup> of April Mrs Nnene had the privilege of accompanying a group of our students on a trip to Royal Holloway, University of London, for their Scholars

Event and the experience was nothing short of transformative.

As we arrived at the gates of RHUL, they couldn't help but be struck by the sense of grandeur that enveloped the campus. Towering buildings, green spaces, and bustling crowds of students created a vibrant blend of academic life. Our students, curious, took in the sights with a sense of wonder.

Our first stop was the lecture theatre we were going to be sat in, where we were greeted by friendly student ambassadors who shared their knowledge about the university's programs and offerings. The students listened intently as they learned about the various academic departments, extracurricular activities, and support services available to them. It was clear that they were beginning to see the myriad possibilities that lay before them.

We were early so we used this opportunity to take photos, walked around the university and tried to familiarise ourselves with specific places. We were then sighted by more ambassadors who Introduced themselves to our

students. These ambassadors took us to the lecture theatre where the graduation programme was meant to begin.

The speaker began with three questions which were:

Who here wants to go to university? Who here has started research on what they want to study? Who has heard of RHU?

Many hands were raised in response to these questions.

The university widening access officer, James spoke about the university being a campus-based university. He explained the difference between city and campus university. The Student Ambassadors introduced themselves. One was final year in Law and Politics, who had had a year in industry, working for Bentley and has now got a Graduate Training Scheme with Barclays after he graduates. A representative or two from each school introduced themselves. Our spokes scholars were Demi and Asya. Both did excellently well. Students were asked to reflect on what they had done throughout the course and the skills gained. Examples such as the ability to do independent research work, working as a team, having good communication skills and being able to prioritise were discussed by our students. They had considered a range of perspectives. Students also summarised their Scholars Programme Journey.



Next, we embarked on a guided tour of the university, led by enthusiastic student ambassadors who spoke to our students in detail about university life. From the historic buildings steeped in tradition to the state-of-the-art facilities designed for cutting-edge research, each stop on the tour offered a glimpse into the academic and social experiences that will inspire our students.

One of the highlights of the trip was a visit to the university's library, a vast repository of knowledge that seemed to stretch on for miles. The students marvelled at the rows of books, the quiet study nooks, and the bustling computer labs, imagining the countless hours they could spend immersed in learning and exploration.

As the day ended, we gathered for a panel discussion with current students who shared their insights and experiences about life at RHUL. From living accommodation to campus clubs, GP practice and organizations, the speakers offered valuable advice and answered the students' questions with honesty and enthusiasm. It was a moment of connection and camaraderie, a glimpse into the vibrant community that could await any of our students.

As we boarded the bus to return home, I couldn't help but feel a sense of gratitude for the opportunity to accompany these students on their journey of discovery. For many of them, this trip was the first step towards realising that higher education is possible.

As we drove away from RHUL, I looked out at the students, their faces alive with excitement, content, possibility and newfound appreciation for the pursuit of knowledge. Our students ventured beyond the classroom walls and began to see the world of possibilities that awaited them.





### Belgium - Battlefields Trip 2024

In April Miss McGuire, the History department, Miss Hayes & Mr Pickering had the pleasure of taking 100 Year 9 students on an unforgettable trip to Belgium. It was both educational and deeply moving. The well-planned itinerary gave students a great mix of history, remembrance, and cultural experiences. Although each coach was on a slightly different schedule, we visited the same places over the two days we were in Belgium and this article will summarise what we got up to.







On the first day we visited the St Julian Canadian Memorial, a solemn tribute to the bravery of Canadian troops during the Second Battle of Ypres. We went to Tyne Cot British Cemetery, the largest Commonwealth war cemetery in the world to pay our respects to the thousands of soldiers laid to rest there. Then for a contrast we visited the Langemark German Cemetery, which was a powerful reminder of the universal cost of war, no matter what side soldiers fought on.




One of the favourite places we visited on the first day was Passchendale Museum, through interactive displays and authentic trench reconstructions, the museum really brought the Battle of Passchendaele to life.



After dinner we indulged in one of Belgium's most delightful offerings – chocolate! Students got to visit the chocolate shop and buy some goodies to take home. We then headed to our spots for the Last Post ceremony that takes place every day in Ypres. We were fortunate to see the Commissioner of the Australian Veterans of the First who was in Ypres visiting similar places to us for ANZAC day. Rebecca, Dylan and Mahdi also got the opportunity to lay a wreath on behalf of Marshalls Park.



The next day we visited Essex Farm Cemetery and Dressing Station, we stood where Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae wrote his famous poem, "In Flanders Fields." The site, once a battlefield medical post, gave us insight into the medical challenges faced during the war. We visited Lijssenthoek British Cemetery, the second largest Commonwealth cemetery in Belgium. Our favourite place that students enjoyed the most for the second day was

The Bronze expedition is notoriously the most difficult, as the students have not undertaken an expedition before they don't know what to expect! The weather can play a big part in any excursion,

Every team's goal for the Bronze expedition is to develop their navigation skills and work as a team and there were some really good examples of this over the weekend. Each student showed a great deal of resilience and determination over the two days; you do not get given a Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award you have to earn it!

All expeditions are a physical and mental challenge. The 45 students learned a great deal about themselves over the weekend and once the tiredness wears off, they will be extremely proud of what they have achieved.




### Drama

Well done, Poppy, we are all very proud of you!




Havering U12 5 vs 2 Chelmsford and Mid Essex U12

Great to see Joel Berry (Yr 7), play for the Havering District side this year. He is diverse player and has represented the team both in midfield and as a striker.


Havering had a great season in the league, and won the District Cup, beating local rivals Chelmsford and Mid Essex.


In order to achieve the award, schools are required to demonstrate how they are/have:


